limutes of a meeting held in the Druids Club Rooms, Druids Chambers, Woodward Street, Wellington, commoning at 11 a.m. on Tuesday 7th larch 1972 and continuing until Thursday 8th larch 1972.

Mr. Forsyth declared the meeting open and extended a welcome to all members. He said he understood that crop reports were not good. It was quite some considerable time since all members

of the Executive had met and he was sure they would all be looking forward to this meeting to deal with all the matters which had accrued.

Mr. Whalley had been in touch with the President and the Secretary regarding non-attendance on Tuesday 7th Harch 1972.

On the motion of Mr. Forsyth, seconded Mr. Dickinson it was resolved that ir. Whalley be granted leave of absence for 7 Farch 1972.

The Minutes of the meeting held on 7th and 8th September 1971 were queried for accuracy in two places. On Page 5, heading "Conference 1971", Fr. Cloake said that the words " and escort them to their places" should be inserted after the word "arrived" and before the word "preferably" in the fourth line of the narration.

ir. Cloake said that on page 6 in the second paragraph under Concept 4 the words "covering a producer levy" should be inserted in the second line between the word "remit" and the word "which" and the words "at Greymouth in 1971" be added on the second line after the word "Conference".

On the motion of Mr. Cloake, seconded Mr. Jansen, it was resolved that the Manutes of the Executive meeting held on 7th and 8th September 1971, as amended above and as previously circulated, be confirmed as a true and correct record.

HATTERS ARISING OUT OF MINUTES:

(a) Mheems: The Secretary reported that he had had an acknowledgement from this firm advising that they were investigating complaints about defective containers and had also had a reply from the General Manager of the H.M.S. stating that he had the matter continually under scrutiny.

(b) Discount Service: The Secretary reported that he had had a reply from Federated Farmers on this matter and in the Secretary's opinion the easiest method would be for members of the Association to avail themselves of the Federated Farners scheme.

(c) Carriage of Boos:
The Secretary reported that he had had consultations with an officer of the M.A.C. in this connection and it am agreed that endeavours should be made to here an officer of the Corporation attend the Executive meeting.

(d) President's Honorarium;
The President said that a member had queried the increase in his honorarium, but it was noted that this was by resolution in the September meeting and that irr. Porsyth had shetained from voting.

(e) Lovel of Resumeration for Biplomaholders:
On the motion of ir. Clocks, seconded ir. Jamsen, it was resolved that the Secretary write again to the Secretary of the Royal Institute of Northulbure to assortain what progress had been made by the latter in his submissions to the State Services Commission.

(f) Honey lived:

Nr. Bartrum and that at the time of the previous meeting of September 1971, he had seen a law draughtsman of the Crown Lew Office and subsequently had seen the Private Secretary of Ir. D.J. Riddiford, the then limister of Justice.

The Encountive thought that this matter should be pursued. On the motion of ir. Bickinson, seconded ir. Bartrum it was resolved that a deputation of the Executive commisting of lessers. Bartrum and Bickinson, endewour to see the new Hinnier of Justice, Sir Roy Jack, during the term of this Executive neeting. To this end the Secretary contacted a ir. Tidswell, Private Secretary to Sir Roy Jack, asking him what Progress had been made.

in. Tidewell telephoned beet on 7 Narch 1972 and maid in essence that the Covernment has decided to include in the next emendment to the Sele of Liquor Act, an amendment to allow mammfacturers to sell Honey Head housever, they could not sell direct to the public but must sell to holders of resellers' licenses. The Scorteary rang Nr. Tidswell and acked:

(a) whether there were any indications when the legislation would be introduced;

(b) whether a manufacturer could apply for a resellers!

Ir. Tidswells replies were respectively:
(a) he had no indication;

(b) the question was too technical for him.

It was acreed that the Secretary should pursue this matter.

AUSTRALIAN CONGRESS:

The President said he had received a letter from a ir. John L. Guilfoyle regarding an Australian Consteas and mentioned that the Secretary had approached the Department of Agriculture re potential speakers. The President also reported on cost of travel which had been supplied by the Editor, Mr. L.W. Goss. On the motion of Mr. Bartrum, seconded Mr. Cloake 1; was resolved that the Secretary reply to Mr. Guiltonie advising him that the Association could not make arrangements for an organised tour as such, because of the timing, the reported poor honey crops and the fact that the Association was having its Conference and Annual General Meeting in July in the Morth Island a South Island Seminar was to be held early in September 1461 but that the Association make an offer to publiciae event editorially in the next issue of the "i.Z. De for support by individual beekeepers.

ARRIAGE OF BEING SY AIR:

The President reported he understood ir. Haines was being affected to a great degree by the ruling of the H.A.C. on the carriage of bees. The President said he understood that the airmailing of queen bees was permissible, but of course, this took a day longer in transit than airfreight. Mr. White, another queen breeder was concerned about this delay, it had affected fir. Forsyth in that it was necessary for him to pick up bees on a Saturday. On the motion of Mr. Dickinson, seconded Mr. Jansen, it was resolved that an approach be made to an officer of the N.A.C. to see if suitable fabric bags to contain packages of queen bees would be acceptable.

PACKAGE OF BEES:

(2 lb. of bees)

It was agreed to ask the officer of N.A.C. about this also.

REPLIES FROM DEPARTMENTS OH REMITS:

Remit No. 7 Valkato re H.H.A. having adequate finance at 15. It was agreed that in the absence of any report from the Caucus Committee, this matter be carried forward to the next meeting. Other replies on remits were noted.

ASSOCIATION'S REPRESENTATIVE ON AGRICULTURAL CHEMICAL BOARD:

The Secretary tabled a letter from the Director-General of Agriculture advising that the term of office of Mr. T Pearson expired on 31 March 1972 and asking whom the Association wished to nominate for the ensuing term of three years. On the motion of Mr. Jansen, seconded Mr. Bartrum, it was

resolved that Mr. T. Pearson be re-appointed subject to his consent.

SOUTH ISLAND SEMINAR:

The Secretary reported having received a copy of a letter from Mr. I.M. Forbes of the Horticultural Division of the Department of Agriculture to Mr. M.D. Cloake re a South Island Beckeepers' seminar. Fir. Cloake reported that this will probably be timed for Thursday, Friday and Saturday 31 August, 1 and 2 September 1972, the second day being the field day. He advised that Ir. Vince Cook was on the Committee. Some of the ideas being considered were:

- 1. Economic Use of Time
- 2. Economics of Mechanisation
- 3. Financial construction what is an economic unit ?
- 4. Economic Carrying Capacity of Area Survey of Honey Producing Areas
- 5. Honey Producing ...
- 6. Economics of Artificial Feeding
- 7. Colony Management

It was also envisaged that there would be a panel discussion and it appeared that a good speaker was necessary to speak in lighter voin on beekeeping in the past and beekeeping in the future. The next meeting of the Seminar Sub-Committee was to be held on 21 March 1972. It was possible that the Venice Bay Tearooms or Seven Calca at Timaru would be used and Mr. Cloake advised that an overseas lecturer was a possibility. The Committee comprised Messrs. Cook, Dawson, Robbin, Little, Cosky and Cloake. The President thanked Mr. Cloake for his report and thought the matter was in capable hands and a lot of

thought had been given to this question.

Fir. Jansen said that his area was experiencing a lotof problems with this disease. He estimated that production had been cut by half in certain localities and asked what could be done.

He said that ir. Walton had detected signs of this disease in the Taupo area.

The President said that he had had the same experience as ir. Jonsen with December and January appearing to be the worst months, but that he had also had the problem in the autum.

STEET CLOVER -(MELILOTUS ALBA):

ir. Bartrum reported that efforts had been made to import blue clover seed. He understood that two sacks had been imported into Wellington. ir. Cloake said some had been grown in Southland for seed. He thought Beekeepers should obtain it and if necessary give it to farmers to grow. One possible disadvantage was that one strain of this seed caused bleeding in cattle if they ate too much of it. On the motion of Fr. Bartrum, seconded Fr. Cloake it was resolved that the Secretary request the Crop Research Division at Lincoln University to run trial on Helilotus Alba to see what potential it had as a farming crop and secondly as an anti-erosion plant.

BLUE BORAGE: (VIPER BUGLOSS OR ECHIUM VULGERE)

The Secretary was asked to follow up his letter of 1 October 1971 to the Horticultural Division of the Department of Agriculture with regard to the question of this (Vipers Bugloss) being taken off the List of Moxious Meeds by the Department.

JAPANESE HOMEY MISSION: The President reported that he had been telephoned days previously by Mr. MacDonald of the H.M.A. re a party of Japanese look over his property. This duly happened with a visit to Mr. Forsyth's Plant in the morning and a visit to McKissack's in the afternoon. There were three gentlemen, Fr. Lucas, a liaison representative of Michimen, Mr. Yashima of Mand Mr. Otsuka, who was the Chief Honey Buyer of M.Z. Honey.

Mr. Otsuka thought that Hew Zealand bees were very quiet compared with their Japanese counterparts. said that production in Japan was 100 lb. per hive ir. Forsyth understood they were wanting large quantities of honey in Japan this year.

PORT AGRICULTURAL OFFICER'S REPORT:

ir. Cloake reported that in the Timeru Herald on it. Spith 30th October 1971, there was an article by ir. T. 1. Smith Amongst recent items intercepted during his inspection of all lugrage from overseas was "some second-hand beekeeper equipment from the U.X.". This appared that the tag a bee veil. was a bee veil. The potential danger of course; the importation of mites which could cause acarine diseases.

CARRIAGE OF BEES BY ATR:

At 4 p.m. ir. Fergusson from H.A.C attended the promise He said there were large shipments of hive bees the history to date. The President noted that airmig. was still acceptable for the carriage of bees.

Fergusson commented on this by saying that the Post Office's standards were not so restrictive. of view it seemed that the problem was:

CADETSHIP AND SYLLABUS FOR HATIOHAL DIPLOMA:

ir. Dickinson read a report of what had been achieved by the Cadetship Investigation Committee. He said in addition that he knew of three or four cadeta who could start in beekeeping straight away. It would seem that the first move was for the H.B.A. to appoint a national cadetship co-ordinator. On the motion of Fr. Bartrum, seconded Fr. Cloake, it was resolved that ir. Dickinson be the first national codetahin co-ordinator. On the motion of Mr. Dickinson, seconded Mr. Jansen, it was resolved that the Secretary write to lessrs. Heinenam and Cook thanking them for their services whilst they were members of the Cadetship Investigation Committee.

EKEEPIEG COURSE FOR STUDENTS AT LINCOLH UNIVERSITY:

On the motion of Mr. Bartrum, seconded Mr. Dickinson it was resolved that the Secretary write to Lincoln University inquiring whether any progress had been made towards including a beekeeping course for all students following the visit by lessrs. Bartrum and Penrose in May 1971 and the bringing down of suggestions in a subsequent report from the University.

REVIEW OF DIPLOMA SYLLABUS:

On the motion of Fr. Cloake, seconded Fr. Dickinson, it was resolved that ir. Bob Walsh be approached and asked to give his recommendation on the widening of the scope for examiners for the diploma in Agriculture and the subject Practical Stage 3. At 5.45 p.m. on 7 March 1972 on the Motion of Mr. Cloake

seconded Fir. Dickinson it was resolved that the Executive

go into Committee.

At 6.22 p.m. on the motion of Mr. Bartrum, seconded ir. Jansen, it was resolved that the Executive come out of Committee and confirm the business done in Committee. At 6.25 p.m. the meeting was adjourned until the following morning.

The Heeting was resumed at 9.12 a.m. on Wednesday 8th March 1972.

CORRESPONDENCE WITH IR. BIRD:

The PResident raised the question of earlier correspondence received from Fr. Bird and stated that in his opinion

Nr. Bird had regarded the matter as being closed. On the motion of Nr. Dickinson, seconded Nr. Bartrum, it was <u>regolved</u> that no further action be taken in regard to Nr. Bird's correspondence.

WAIKATO BRANCH:

A letter from the Waikato Branch was tabled concerning three points:

- the dissatisfaction with the service and supply of cans from Alex Harvey Industries.
- The Branch's disappointment in the harmless remits relating to wasp baits.
- The control of use of tape recorders at Conferences.

(i) Alex Earvey Industries:
The President said that he had taken the opportunity of calling on this firm and complaining about the service and he had since one personal instance when his order was delivered within one week. On the motion of Mr. Cloake, seconded Mr. Jansen, it was resolved that the Secretary write to Alex Harvey
Industries advising them that there were numerous instances of beekeepers suffering serious delays in the supply of stock lines of honey containers with subsequent disruption of their sales.

It was felt by the members of the Executive that the Wasp bait criticism was somewhat harsh. On the motion of Mr. Dickinson, seconded Mr. Clonke, it was resolved that the Secretary advise the Maikato Branch that the matter of wasp baits had been dealt with in the minutes of the September meeting of the Executive, and would also be dealt with on the 8 Harch 1972 with the departmental officers and that the Executive were actively pursuing the matter

(iii) Tape Recorders: On the motion of Mr. Dickinson, seconded Mr. Cloake it was resolved that the Executive recommend that Chairmen of all Annual General Rectings of the Association ask members for a declaration of all tape recorders in their possession and then for the Chairman to rule on their

On the motion of ir. Jansen, Seconded ir. Dickinson it was resolved that the Executive go into Committee.

CONFERENCE 1972:

The Secretary tabled a letter from Mr. Haines, Secretary of the Far Horth Branch, received by him on 6 March 1972

On the motion of Mr. Dickinson, seconded Mr. Jansen, it was resolved that the Conference be held on Mednesday 12 July, 1972 Thursday 13th July 1972 and Friday 14 July 1972 up until midday and that the preceding Executive meeting be held on Honday 10 July 1972 and Tuesday 11 July 1972, starting at 9 a.m. sharp on Monday.

At this stage, 10.45 a.m., Ir. Whelley arrived at the

On the motion of Ir. Whalley seconded Fir. Cloake it was resolved that the Secretary approach ir. Allan Dick H.P., STEPS TO BE TAKEN IN CAMPAIGHING PRIOR TO CONFERENCE:

to open the Conference and on the motion of Mr. Jansen, to the conference and on the motion of Ar. Jansen, seconded Mr. Bartrum it was resolved that the Hon. D.J Carter, be invited if Mr. Dick was not available.

ir. Whalley mentioned the Caucus Committee findings and said he was of the opinion that the Executive should be unanimous in what they proclaimed the industry should

This matter was not pursued and discussions lapsed.

PRICE FREEZE.

The President reported that he understood the H.H.A. had applied for exemption for the price freeze, but no official communication had been received from the Authority and the information was only verbal. iir. Whalley said he was against the Association supporting any such application. The President said he was associated with the last application.

lir. Cloake said it appeared that applications could be made:

1. if the overseas price affected the local market. if there were hardships.

On the motion of Hr. Bartrum, seconded Hr. Dickinson it was resolved that the Association give full support to the H.H.A. application to have honey both wholesale and retail, exempted from the price freeze. It was also ir. Bartrum's move that the motion be put.

RESIGNATION STRATFORD: The Secretary tabled a letter of resignation from in. Stratford on the grounds that:

1. the proposed \$10 levy;

the decreased income owing to the H.H.A. absurd pay offers;

the ineffective co-operation of the N.B.A. and Government.

On the motion of Mr. Jansen, seconded Mr. Whalley it was resolved that in Stratford's resignation be accepted and that the Secretary advise him.

that the \$10 levy was not yet in effect and the fate of the Hotice of Motion would be decided at the 1972 Conference;

that he should direct his criticism about the H.H.A payouts to the H.H.A., whose Board comprised of duly and democratically elected members;

3. his attention should be drawn to Rule 18 wherein he would see that the Executive were elected by the members and that had he not resigned, he would have had a remedy by displacing the present Executive at the next Conference. Secondly, that he still has a remedy in the 1972 General Elections to displace his local member if he is dissatisfied with the Government.

H.M.A. GRAHT:

The President reported that following the application of 16 August 1971 to the H.H.A. for an increase in the grant from \$2900 to \$4000 per annum, an addition of \$1100 and \$550 had been received from the Authority on 9 December 1971 representing an increase in the half yearly grant from \$1450 to \$2000.

PRODUCER RELATIONS:

Fr. Jansen said he thought that the Authority's relations with producers could be improved. There appeared to be gaps in their circularising to suppliers and he thought also that members should be travelling around talking to suppliers. Mr. Jansen said that one of the staff of the Authority

had told him that he thought that this was one of their weaknesses.

Wearnotses.

Mr. Goss advised that he had received no response to requests to the Authority for material for publication in the "if.Z. Beekeeper".

The President on the other hand, said that the General Manager had been telephoning suppliers and he had had one tour in the Waikato area and one tour in the Hawkes Bay area.

On the motion of Fir. Cloake, seconded Fir. Bartrum it was resolved that the Secretary write to the Authority stressing the importance of greater communication between the Authority and its suppliers, the use of which, the Executive felt, could be of advantage to the Authority in encouraging greater quantities of honey being supplied to it and further that the authority be urged to exploit the potential of the "I.Z. Beekeeper" in the editorial columns and further that the Authority develop more fully their present newsletter.

LOW PAY OUT FOR DARKER HONEYS:

ir. Jansen said that he thought that for darker honeys there was too drastic a downwards adjustment. He felt he was not alone in this opinion. After some discussion ir. Bartrum moved that separate pools be kept for the South Island and the North Island areas and pay-outs be made accordingly.

This motion lapsed for want of a seconder. On the motion of lir. Jansen, seconded lir. Forsyth it was resolved that this Executive ask the H.M.A., for a reexamination of the grading system with a view to providing more categories. This would make matters worse for the darker honeys.

INPORTATION OF HOMEY:

The President reported on what had transpired to date. An official submission had been sent to the Comptroller of Customs and copy to A. Dick and these had been acknowledged.

The Association's grounds for opposing the importation were:

1. the viability of the industry

2. the risk of the importation of diseases. ir. Bartrum had expressed the wish that a follow-up letter be sent, but ir. Forsyth had persuaded him that this was not necessary.

DEPARTMENTAL OFFICERS: At 2.15 p.m. In. J.H. Watt Director Advisory Services Division, Dept. A. and Mr. E. Smaellie, Superintendent of Beekeeping attended the meeting. The President velcomed these two centlemen and said he would like to think that the excellent relationship which existed when Mr. Arthur Greig was with the Department would continue. ir. Watt said that he would give the thoughts of the

Executive every consideration. He made the point that he would like to be warned in advance of the subjects to be brought up at these meetings Specific subjects discussed:-

Hileage for Apiary Hr. Watt said there were not restrictions now.

Department said that as far back as 1964 the Department of Health were to bring forward legislation in this respect.

The Association was now becoming concerned at the delay in the legislation coming forward. In: Smellie said that, until the legislation was passed. Apiary instructors should be handling matters in connection with honey houses, but there did appear to be a variation in standards imposed.

(c) Australian Congress
The President mentioned the idea of having
departmental speakers.

For Smaellie wondered what benefit this would be
to the New Zealand honey industry.

For Matt thought that the Association should ask
for Guilfoyle to make a direct approach to the
Director-General of Agriculture and to state the
proposed subject matter for the addresses.

(d) Masps
The President asked what new developments there had been in wasp eradication.
Hr. Smeallie said that the Entomological Division of the D.S.I.R. was actively engaged in experimenting on attractant batts and ir. Graham Walton was collaborating with them.
Hr. Porsyth said that the Maikato Branch of the Association was so concerned that they proposed laumch a radio and press campaign in the Waikato area.
Hr. Jansen said that Hr. Tuck, Secretary of the Waikato Branch, did not appear to have had a resty from the Department regarding wasps, but Hr. Smeallie assured him that the letter had gone.

Allocation of Expenses for Seminars
The President raised the question of the sharing of expenses for Seminars. Fir. Bartrum said he recalled that Mr. Greig had said there was a section of the Department of Agriculture that organised schools etc., that help in this way. help in this way. ection that did not do its own organising. branches of the Department of Agriculture organise this type of seminar themselves. this type of seminar thought it would be better for the beekeeping industry if the Apiary Section was on the same footing as other divisions of the Department. He thought that it was not the system that had changed, but the approach. The financial part to would have to be handled by the Association, no the Department, with any surplus funds being p in trust. in trust.

It was agreed that the Secretary should write Mr. V. Cook in line with the procedure suggest by lir. Matt.

(f) Nosema
The President said he suspected Hosema was very
prevalent and he would like to express thanks to
the Department for making in. Walton available to
investigation work.
He asked how this was progressing.
Her. Smeellie advised that the diagnostic work
still not completed.

(5) Blue Borage (Viper Bugloss)
It appeared that the Secretary's original letter had not been received by the Animal Health District of the Department, but Ir. Latt undertook to that this matter was pursued if the Secretary

provided him with a photostat copy of the original letter.

(h) <u>Diploma Committee</u>
The Royal Institute of Horticulture had suggested that ir. Smaellie and Professor Veale be on this Committee. Ir. Dickinson asked if ir. Smaellie could recommend a further member of the Committee. It was agreed that this matter be left for ir. Dickinson to action.

(i) Release of Control over the Importation of Honey
The President said the industry was alarmed over
this possibility, if only on the grounds of the
risk of importing diseases.
In Smaellie did not think the risk of diseases
was very great.
In Jansen wondered whether diseases that New
Zeeland did not have at present, e.g. European
Fowl Brood, could come into the country. He
understood that after becombs, honey was the best
way of spreading diseases.
In Smaellie said the bigger the dilution, the less
risk was with honey.
In Smaellie said that in his personal opinion, there
was no great risk.

Correspondence from the Department
The President said he was compelled to bring to the notice of the Department's officers the concern expressed by the Executive and from time to time by the Branches of the Association, at the lack of response by the Department to correspondence sent to them. He said that this matter had been brought to a head through the editor bringing up a certain matter. ir. Smaellie said that if the President was referring to the Waikato Branch Secretary and the field day, he had already mentioned his resources and Mr. Walton would be sent up there as soon as possible. Mr. Walton had been informed just as soon as Mr. Smaellie had been able to do so. The President said that what he was really concerned about, was the alleged illegal importation of bees. Fir. Smaellie said that the Department had to go into the legal niceties of the matter, but legal advice was now available to the Department. He could tell the Executive that the matter was not as cut and dried as it appeared. Fir. Goss said that the one and only reply he had had from the Department was on October 22, 1971, At this stage the President said that the matter was being regarded as one of policy, not of substance. Mr. Smaellie said there were several factors all working at the same time and that he had spoken to Mr. Goss in December and thought that it was sufficient advice to him. He was watching the position closely. Mr. Watt summed up by saying that he hoped the Executive would accept his concern

about the matter.

On the motion of Mr. Bartrum seconded Mr. Forsyth it was resolved that Mr. Srhoj, the Chairman of the Maunganui County Council open

the Conference instead of Mr. Dick.

AGRICULTURAL CHEMICALS REPORT:

On the motion of Mr. Whalley seconded Mr. Bartrum it was resolved that the report be adopted and Mr. Pearson be commended for his effort and comprehensive report. It was agreed that Mr. Dickinson

would present Mr. Pearson's report.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING:

On the motion of Mr. Whalley seconded Mr. Cloake it was resolved that the Minutes of the Meeting held on March 7th. 1972 as previously circulated, be taken as read and be confirmed as being a true and

correct record subject to amendments.

ALEX. HARVEY: Mr. Forsyth reported that he had called at the Auckland plant of

Alex. Harvey in connection with delays in delivery.

AUSTRALIAN CONVENTION: It was agreed that Mr. Goss feature the Australian Convention in the August Journal.

HONEY HOUSES:

On the motion of Mr. Bartrum seconded Mr. Cloake it was resolved that the Secretary reply to the letter of 1st. May expressing

concern and looking forward to a copy of the Draft Legislation as soon as available.

On the motion of Mr. Bartrum seconded Mr. Whalley it was resolved that publication re the Massey Research Unit be made in the N.Z. Beekeeper.

HONEY PACKERS ASSOCIATION:

Mr. Forsyth thought that the Executive should reciprocate the previous invitation of the Honey Packers Association to members of the Executive and invite members of the Packers Association Executive to attend the N.B.A. Executive Meeting if possible, at this session.

On the motion of Mr. Dickinson seconded Mr. Jansen it was <u>resolved</u> that the President's decision in asking a Packers Representative to address the 1972 Conference be ratified.



Mr. Bartrum said that he gained the impression that the Packers thought there had been no serious conflict within the last twelve months. They were, however, concerned at cheap honey being on tap and were writing to the Health Department to see if the Department could prevent it.

There was some criticism by the Packers Association re \$1000 Government interest free loan, and the lateness the industry heard it was available to beekeepers. The Packers considered that with the high prices overseas the H.M.A. were getting the use of the seals levy for stablisation was not justified. The Packers thought that prices should be fixed and then put out by the H.M.A. at the beginning of each year, Mr. Forsyth expressed thanks to Mr. Bartrum for his attendance at the Packers Association Meeting.

SUBSCRIPTIONS:

On the motion of Mr. Forsyth seconded Mr. Martrum it was resolved that a recommendation be made to Conference that Mr. Bob. Walsh be elevated to the status of Life Member. In view of the fact that Mr. Walsh was unable to be present at Conference it was agreed that the certificate be handed to Mr. Walsh at the Department of Agriculture.

MONDAY NIGHT'S BUSINESS:

On the motion of Mr. Dickinson seconded Mr. Cloake it was <u>resolved</u> that no new business be introduced after 9.30 p.m. on Monday 10th. July, 1972.

DEFERRED BUSINESS:

On the motion of Mr. Forsyth seconded Mr. Cloake it was <u>resolved</u> that Mr. Ekroyd's letter and Mr. Davies letter be deferred until the H.M.A. members were present on the 11th. July, 1972.

ANNUAL ACCOUNTS

AND AUDITORS
REPORT:

It was agreed that the sum of \$170.52 being stock and stationery be written off from the next year's accounts.

AUDITOR'S REPORT:

On the motion of Mr. Jansen seconded Mr. Whalley it was <u>resolved</u> that the Auditor's Report be received and a proper Minute Book be purchased.

HONEY MEAD:

On the motion of Mr. Bartrum seconded Mr. Whalley it was resolved that the Secretary see the Minister of Justice to have provision made in the Liquor Amendment Act to permit the sale of Honey Mead from Honey Mead Manufacturers premises.

VIPERS
BLUEGLOSS:

On the motion of Mr. Bartrum seconded Mr. Cloake it was resolved that the Secretary write direct to the County Council's Association and also to the Federated Farmers, pointing out that this should be removed from noxious weeds lists as it was not harmful to stock, not like gorse and it was O.K. for stock in drought times and O.K. for bees in drought times.

ADVERTISING:

The Secretary tabled an opinion from Mr. Hardie Boys the Association Solicitor.

On the motion of Mr. Whalley seconded Mr. Jansen it was <u>resolved</u> that the letter from Mr. Hardie Boys be received and referred to the incoming committee.

INSURANCE:

Mr. Whalley reported that he had sprayed with arsenical spray. The cattle from a neighbouring farm had got a lick of the arsenic and pushed down a fence. Five heifers and one cow had died. The cows had been worth \$905 each and the heifers \$95 each, and the Vet's, fee disposed of \$120. Mr. Whalley's insurance with the N.Z. Insurance Co. had covered this.

The meeting adjourned at 12.42 p.m. with the Executive to meet at 1.45 p.m. and the Secretary to attend at 2 p.m. after working on delegates votes calculations.

At 2.12 p.m. Mr. Forsyth welcomed the H.M.A.

MR. T. PALMER-JONES: Mr. Forsyth welcomed Mr. T. Palmer-Jones who spoke to the report he had supplied. Mr. Whalley wondered whether there was any opportunity of Queen Bees from the Islands being imported. Mr. Palmer-Jones did not think this was possible.

Mr. Goss raised the question of B.L. Mr. Palmer-Jones said that this was a real risk. The American B.L. spores were dangerous but the European B.L. spores were not a risk. The trouble with the American ones was that antibiotics had been used to suppress them.

DEPARTMENTAL:

At 4.15 p.m. Mr. Forsyth welcomed Mr. J. Watt and Mr. E. Smaellie from the Department.

WASP BAITS:

Mr. Smaellie said that the matter had been handed over to the Entymological Division of the D.S.I.R. He understood baits were used in the U.S.A. but they were not successful in New Zealand. Work was continuing.

SOUTH ISLAND SEMINAR:

Mr. Watt said he was leaving the door open to make changes for the future and to this end perhaps the Executive should approach him.

Mr. Cloake asked whether the printing costs for the proceedings would be borne by the Department. Mr. Watt asked how many copies and how long the report would be. Mr. Cloake thought there would be 150 copies each of 100 pages. The question was left open by Mr. Watt.

SECTION 9 OF THE APIARIES ACT: Mr. Forsyth said there were cases where Aparies had changed hands but section 9 was not being implemented thoroughly enough. He wondered whether the Department could ask Mr. Bennet to move more promptly when there were changes to ownership.

Messrs. Poole, Ekroyd, Fraser, Cloake and MacDonald attended.

METRIC

MEASUREMENTS:

Mr. Pool wondered what the consumer reaction would be. Mr. MacDonald thought that sizes should be 250, 500 and 1000 grammes for wax or plaster and that a date for change over should be fixed.

PRICES OF

IMPORTED HONEYS: Mr. Poole said that the H.M.A. would help in this respect.

PRICE FREEZE:

Mr. Poole explained that there were two categories. Category (a) where there could be no increase in price prior to approval from the Stabilisation Authority. Category (b) prices could be increased so long as there could be justification of the increases after 1/10/71 on the basis of increases in costs from 1/10/71 to the date of the increase.

FINANCE:

Mr. Forsyth pointed out to the H.M.A. the dire financial situation in which the N.B.A. found itself.

AMALGAMATION:

Mr. Whalley wondered whether the N.B.A. and H.M.A. could become one body.

At 6.05 p.m. the H.M.A. members withdrew.

At 6.06 p.m. Messrs. Ekroyd, Poole, Fraser and Cloake appeared to speak to the Ekroyd Alternative Scheme.

This meeting terminated at 6.45 p.m.

MINUTES OF MEETING HELD IN THE CONFERENCE ROOM OF THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE, CHRISTCHURCH, COMMENCING AT 9 A.M. ON MONDAY 11TH. SEPTEMBER, 1972 AND CONTINUING THROUGH TO 12TH. SEPTEMBER, 1972.

PRESENT:

Mr. I.J. Dickinson in the Chair.

Messrs. J. Bray, M. Haines, D. Penrose, E. Whalley.

IN ATTENDANCE:

Mr. E.R. Neal, Association Secretary.

OPENING:

Mr. Dickinson welcomed members of the Executive to the second meeting since they took office. He said there was a lengthy Agenda and some very important business to be transacted.

APOLOGIES:

There was a written apology from Mr. M. Cloake which was read out by the Secretary. In speaking to his motion Mr. Penrose said in his opinion there were three reasons only which could be advanced for absence, and elaborated on them. He did not think any of these applied to Mr. Cloake. On the motion of Mr. Penrose seconded Mr. Bray it was resolved that Mr. Cloake's apology be not accepted on the grounds that it did not fulfil the criteria of (a) personal illness (b) an immediate bereavement or (c) an unexpected omergency.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS

MEETING:

The Secretary explained that owing to pressure of work he had not been able to prepare the Minutes for the 10th. and 11th. of July, 1972, but he had a summary of the matters discussed therein.

On the motion of Mr. Penrose, seconded Mr. Whalley it was resolved that the Minutes of the Executive Meeting held at Kaitaia on the 14th. July, 1972 as previously circulated be confirmed as a true and correct record of proceedings.

HONEY HOUSES:

Mr. Penrose explained that Health Department Inspectors were just looking at honey houses and not inspecting them.

EDITOR:

Mr. Penrose queried why the matter of the new Editor's appointment had been kept confidential. Mr. Haines raised the question of whether the new appointment should have been advertised. The President ruled this out of order in line with the July Executive Minutes.



On the motion of Mr. Whalley, seconded Mr. Bray it was resolved that the Executive confirm Mr. N. Stanton's appointment as new Editor.

On the motion of Mr. Haines, seconded Mr. Penrose it was resolved that in future it be recommended to incoming executives that all appointments be advertised.

On the motion of Mr. Bray, seconded Mr. Penrose it was resolved that Mr. L. Goss be thanked for his services in the past and his services to Beekeeping generally.

TARIFF AND DEVELOPMENT BOARD INQUIRY ON THE IMPORTATION OF HONEY:

Mr. Dickinson reported on the proceeding. It appeared that there was certain work to be done by the Honey Marketing Authority in supplying the Board with the price range of imported honies over the previous year.

RANGIORA SUB-BRANCH:

It was moved by Mr. Penrose that the letters be received and the Executive move on to the next bisiness. agreed that the Secretary write to Mr. leffries.

RESIGNATION OF MR. FRANKLIN:

It was agreed that this was a Branch matter.

RESIGNATION OF MR. JACK DAVIES:

It was reported that the letter of intention to resign had now been withdrawn.

SEMINAR REPORT: Mr. Dickinson recapitulated what had transpired from March onward in regard to the South Island Seminar. On the motion of Mr. Bray, seconded Mr. Penrose, it was resolved that the Secretary write to the Department of Agriculture advising that the Executive understood that the present position had come about through the over zealousness of a member, whose actions however, the Executive did not condone. Further, that the Executive would revert to the original procedure because of its advantages. Further, that it be explained to the Department of Agriculture that established policy was departed from by a Beekeeper who was a member of the South Canterbury Branch and incidentally only a member of the Executive

> It was reported that there were 100 registrations for the Seminar. There would be two major and 100 other tree presentations. A social had been arranged for the Friday night. There was some doubt about who would bear the printing costs.

CADETSHIP:

Mr. Dickinson reported that there were three stages in the Diploma of Agriculture. A junior certificate, an intermediate certificate and a full Diploma. He thought that it would be of advantage to have a certificate in Beekeeping instituted at the stage where the intermediate certificate had been gained. It was agreed that Mr. Stanton run an article in the New Zealand Beekeeper regarding cadetship.

NEW ZEALAND MOTOR

CORPORATION:



The Secretary explained that he had had an approach from this motor firm which seemed to envisage discounts for members buying from that particular supplier. It was agreed that the Secretary write to the New Zealand Motor Corporation saying a pre condition would be that firms take a whole page of paid advertising in the N.Z. Beekeeper. On the motion of Mr. Whalley, seconded Mr. Haines, it was resolved that the Executive agree in principle with the offer by the New Zealand Motor Corporation and that the President and Secretary have power to act.

CONFERENCE 1972:

On the motion of Mr Whalley, seconded by Mr Cloake, it was resolved that the Minutes of the meeting held on 10 and 11 July 1972 in the lounge of the Kaitaia Hotel, as previously circulated, be confirmed as being a true and correct record of the proceedings.

On the motion of Mr Whalley, seconded Mr Penrose, it was resolved that the word 'approve' be substituted for the word 'condone' in line 7 of the paragraph on the Seminar in the Minutes of 11 September 1972.

On the motion of Mr Penrose, seconded Mr Haines, it was resolved that the Minutes of the meeting held in the Board Room of the Department of Agriculture, Christchurch, on 11 September 1972 as previously circulated, and as amended by this meeting, be confirmed as being a true and correct record of proceedings.

FINANCE:

The President reported that letters had been received from various branches in response to the directive by Executive to send to general headquarters half-rof their branch balances at 30 April 1972. The President said he proposed to take these letters branch by branch.

Far North Branch: On the motion of Mr Penrose, seconded Mr Whalley, it was resolved that the letter be received and that no further action be taken.

Auckland Branch: It was moved by Mr Penrose, seconded Mr Whalley, that Auckland contribution be accepted with tlanks and that any further claim be waived.

It was moved by Mr Dickinson that this motion lie on the table.



North Otago Branch: On the motion of Mr Penrose, seconded Mr Cloake, it was resolved that the President telephone during the course of the meeting the President of the North Otago Branch.

Waikato Branch: On the motion of Mr Dickinson, seconded Mr Haines, it was resolved that a letter of sincere thanks for their contribution be sent to Waikato Branch.

Bay of Plenty Branch: On the motion of Mr Bray, seconded Mr Cloake, it was resolved that during the course of the meeting the President ring the President of the Bay of Plenty Branch.

Hawkes Bay Branch: On the motion of Mr Bray, seconded Mr Penrose, it was resolved that the President during the course of the meeting ring the President of the Hawkes Bay Branch.

Central & Southern Hawkes Bay: On the motion of Mr Bray, seconded Mr Whalley, it was resolved that the Secretary write to the Central and Southern Hawkes Bay Branch explaining the position.

South Western Branch: It was agreed that the Secretary write expressing thanks for their contribution.

Nelson Branch: On the motion of Mr Whalley, seconded Mr Bray, it was resolved that, in view of Nelson Branch hosting the 1973 Conference, no further action be taken but that the branch be thanked for their contribution.

seconded Mr Haines, On the motion of Mr Penrose,/it was resolved that West Coast Branch, Canterbury Branch, South Canterbury Branch, Southland Branch and Otago Branch be thanked for their contributions.

Auckland Branch: On the motion of Mr Penrose, the previous motion which had lain on the table was lifted. This was as follows:

Proposed Alteration to Homey Marketing Regulations: The President referred to a letter from Mr A. Dick, Parliamentary Under-Secretary for Agriculture, which indicated that Mr Dick had asked the Department to consider implementing the changes suggested by the 1972 Conference.

On the motion of Mr Penrose, seconded Mr Haines, it was <u>resolved</u> that the President and Secretary immediately approach the new Minister of Agriculture in respect to the urgency of the new levy and also the financial situation of the N.B.A.

At this point, 12.28 p.m., the meeting adjourned for lunch, and resumed at 1.20 p.m.

At this stage Mr Dickinson was due to make his 'phone call, so Mr Penrose took the Chair.

BEES BY AIR:

The Secretary reported on a conversation with an officer of N.A.C.

On the motion of Mr Haines, seconded Mr Whalley, it was resolved that the Secretary write to N.A.C. saying that the N.B.A. had approved the 'White' type of wooden cage and the 'Haines' type of plastic cage for carriage of queens by air and that Mr Haines undertake to supply the necessary photographs re the bundling of cages.

Mr Haines reported on packaged bees and said that one of the dangers was of sharp projections which could damage the packages, also stray bees which were attracted to the packaged bee. He wondered whether there was a repellant which could solve the second problem.

On the motion of Mr Haines, seconded Mr Bray, it was resolved that the Secretary write to N.A.C. that Mr Haines is still investigating the question of packaged bees.

NOXIOUS WEEDS: Mr Cloake reported that he was dealing with this matter at branch level and that he would report back to the next meeting.

FINANCE:

Subscriptions: Mr Cloake moved and Mr Haines seconded a motion that subscriptions be subject to a surcharge of \$2.00 per year throughout Mr Penrose moved that this lie on the table. the whole scale.

Mr Bray moved and Mr Haines seconded that the Journal be charged to all members at \$1.00 per annum and non members at \$2.00 per annum, with the increase being effective for non members as renewals came up and for members from May 1973 onwards.

Mr Penrose moved that this motion lie on the table.

At this point Mr Dickinson resumed the Chair.

On the motion of Mr Penrose, seconded Mr Whalley, it was resolved that outstanding branch contributions be pursued by the President and the Secretary.

METRIC

On the motion of Mr Penrose, seconded Mr Dickinson, it was resolved that correspondence be entered into with the H.M.A. and the N.B.A.

SUBSCRIPTIONS: Mr Penrose moved that the motion regarding subscriptions previously lying on the table be uplifted. On the motion of Mr Cloake, seconded Mr Haines, it was resolved that Executive prepare a notice of motion for presentation at the 1973 Annual General Meeting that all subscriptions be subject to a surcharge of \$2.00 per annum throughout the whole scale, effective as soon as possible under the Rules.

> Mr Cloake moved that the motion on the Journal previously laid on the table be uplifted. On the motion of Mr Bray, seconded Mr Haines, it was resolved that the Journal be charged to all members at \$1.00 and to non members at \$2.00 with effect for non members when renewals came up and for members from May 1973 onwards.

LIAISON WITH PACKERS:

The President reported on correspondence he had received from the New Zealand Honey Packers! Association. Mr Whalley moved and Mr Bray seconded a motion that the N.B.A. accept the invitation to send a representative to the N.B.A./Packers talks on 7 December Mr Penrose moved and Mr Haines seconded an amendment that the word 'representatives' (plural) be substituted for the word 'representative' (singular) and that the pronoun 'a' be deleted. Upon the amendment being put, it was carried and the substantive motion became that the N.B.A. accept the invitation to send representatives to the N.B.A./Packers talks on 7 December 1972. This when put was carried.

On the motion of Mr Dickinson, seconded Mr Cloake, it was resolved that the representatives be the Vice-President plus Mr Bray plus Mr Haines.

On the motion of Mr Penrose, seconded Mr Whalley, it was resolved that the action of the President and Mr Bray at the preliminary Timaru discussions with some of the Executive of the New Zealand Honey Packers! Association, with particular reference to the formation of a Packers Sub-Committee within the N.B.A. be recorded and further that this concept be approved in principle with the Executive of the N.B.A. nominating one of their number to be the Packers! Association nominee.

Donations: In view of the serious state of the N.B.A. finances, the question of donations was discussed.

On the motion of Mr Penrose, seconded Mr Whalley, it was resolved that a letter be sent to all members asking them to forward a donation of at least 50% of their last yearly subscriptions to tide the Association over the current difficult period in terms of the following letter:-

"You will note that over the last several years this Association's funds have been declining - last year's deficit was \$1,659.00 - to the point where it can no longer carry on its functions as an effective Industry body.

"At the last Dominion Conference a suggested amendment to the Regulations was approved to make the seals levy applicable to all extracted honey and legislation is now being considered to have this put into effect.

"Until the contribution to the Association from the levy funds is increased to provide adequate funds, it has been found necessary to make an appeal to producers for an amount to tide us over. This is in spite of some branch balances being received. Accordingly we enlist your support and ask that you make a donation of an amount at least equal to half your annual subscription. Unless this money is forthcoming by 15th January 1973 at the latest, the Association's activities will come to a halt through lack of liquid funds.

"Please forward donations, which will be individually recorded, direct to the General Secretary, P.O. Box 1879, Wellington."

SEMINAR:

Mr Cloake reported on the Seminar held on the 14, 15 and 16 September 1972. He said that the reason the Seminar proceedings had not been published was because of the serious financial state of the Association. The Seminar Sub-Committee felt that steps should not be taken to publish until after the Executive meeting of 5 December 1972, because it might be necessary to call on the profits of the Seminar. He said that there was approximately \$200.00 in hand and there were several ways in which to publish the papers. He enumerated these.

Mr Penrose moved that the Executive congratulate the Seminar Sub-Committee for the prudent handling of the finances and suggested that the Sub-Committee prepare papers for distribution under the plan costing \$60.00. This motion <u>lapsed</u> for want of a seconder.

AUDIT

On the motion of Mr Whalley, seconded Mr Penrose, it was <u>resolved</u> that the recording of the Seminar talks be in subsequent issues of the Beekeeper Journal.

On the motion of Mr Dickinson, seconded Mr Bray, it was <u>resolved</u> that the Executive record their thanks in appreciation of the work carried out by the Seminar Sub-Committee.

FINANCE:

Branches: The President reported that he could not get the President of North Otago on the 'phone nor the President of the Bay of Plenty Branch, but had talked to the President of the Hawkes Bay Branch.

On the motion of Mr Dickinson, seconded Mr Haines, it was resolved that in the absence of a presented case from the North Otago Branch and the unavailability of the Branch President on the 'phone on 5 December 1972, the Branch be asked to send 50% of their 30 April 1972 balance forthwith.

Bay of Plenty: On the motion of Mr Bray, seconded Mr Whalley, it was resolved that the Bay of Plenty Branch be advised that their case had been considered but that it was found not acceptable and that they be asked to forward 50% of their 30 April 1972 balance forthwith.

Hawkes Bay: On the motion of Mr Dickinson, seconded Mr Whalley, it was resolved that Hawkes Bay Branch be advised the Executive had considered their case but that Executive felt that in fairness to other branches an axception could not be made in their case and the branch be asked to forward 50% of their 30 April 1972 balance forthwith less any contribution to date.

Discountable Subscriptions: The President reported that this was a matter he intended to bring up at the next Conference.

Overdue Subscriptions: The Secretary reported that it would entail some cost to follow up on overdue subscriptions.

On the motion of Mr Penrose, seconded Mr Dickinson, it was resolved that the Secretary be instructed to carry out the work involved in following up on overdue subscriptions.

Priority for paying of Accounts: It was agreed by Executive that if the Secretary had any difficulty in paying accounts on time the claims for out-of-pocket expenses by the Executive be given lowest priority.



Secretarial Fee: On the motion of Mr Penrose, seconded Mr Whalley, it was resolved that the secretarial fee be increased by 4.2%, being the cost-of-living increase, from the date the increase became effective, in terms of the resolution of Executive passed at Kaitaia in July 1972.

Editorial Fee: On the motion of Mr Dickinson, seconded Mr Cloake, it was resolved that the question of the editorial fee be carried forward to the March meeting.

PROPOSED
ALTERNATIVE
MARKETING
SCHEME:

The President tabled a letter he had received from Mr Iee of the Department of Agriculture containing suggestions in regard to ascertaining the industry's feeling on the scheme.

On the motion of Mr Bray, seconded Mr Cloake, it was resolved that the matter be deferred until the March meeting of Executive on the grounds of (1) the financial state of the N.B.A. and (2) that the time was not opportune owing to the present good payout from the H.M.A.

RULES:

The Secretary reported that he had delayed having the change of Rules implemented on the grounds of cost.

On the motion of Mr Whalley, seconded Mr Haines, it was resolved that the registration of the Rules be implemented forthwith.

RETAIL PRICES:

The President wondered whether Executive were considering recommending higher retail prices. Mr Bray mentioned that the H.M.A. had had to reduce their suggested prices under the Stabilisation Regulations.

Sackers

On the motion of Mr Whalley, seconded Mr Penrose, it was resolved that the H.M.A. be asked to consider remitting the seals levy to packing firms with a view to equalising the export and domestic return.

Mr M. Cloake asked that his dissent be recorded.

LIBRARY COMMITTEE Mr Cloake explained that Mr Bartrum had been a member of the Library Committee but was no longer on the Executive.

On the motion of Mr Bray, seconded Mr Penrose, it was resolved that Mr M. Cloake be appointed a member of the Library Committee.

NEXT MEETING:

On the motion of Mr Penrose, seconded Mr Haines, it was resolved that the next Executive meeting be held in March 1973 in Wellington immediately following the Waikato field day and that a large motel be utilized to accommodate Executive members rather than a hotel.

GUIDELINES FOR CONFERENCES:

It was agreed that Mr Haines be thanked for the Kaitaia notes and that these be typed up for the use of Executive and Nelson Branch.

SECRETARIAL PRIORITIES:

The Chairman directed the Secretary to deal with secretarial matters in the following order:-

1. The circular asking for donations.

2. The letters.

3. The Minutes.

CLOSURE:

There being no further business, the meeting terminated at 6.12 p.m.

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
